HISTORY & HERITAGE —

There is no lake at Kinglake! The Kinglake township was named after British historian Alexander William Kinglake. The Kinglake Ranges ridgeline also marks the boundary of two indigenous territories of the Kulin Nation - the Wurundjeri to the south and the Taungurung to the north.
