


ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF COUNTRY WUMINDJIKA

We are proud to acknowledge the Taungurung and Wurundjeri as the traditional custodians of the land. We pay our respects to First Nations leaders and Elders, past, present and emerging, who are the keepers of history, traditions, knowledge and the culture of this land.



Many of our township and place names derive from traditional language.

- *The Taungurung word for Murrindindi is 'Marramdurandi' meaning 'mountainous, misty place'
- * The name Taggerty is thought to be the aboriginal word for 'Blue Clay'
- * Yarck was the name of a cattle station, thought to be derived from the aboriginal word 'yaruk'
- * Narbethong comes from the Taungurung word 'Naabedhong' meaning cheery and lively
- * Ghin Ghin means meeting of the waters and is a significant indigenous meeting place



Marysville is nestled in a picturesque valley just below Melbourne's closest snow field and all seasons resort at Lake Mountain. It's surrounded by waterfalls, mountain streams and lush green forests and an easily accessible network of spectacular walks and trails.

Marysville Village offers a fabulous selection of cafés, art galleries, gift shops, day spas and accommodation options, and is a great base from which to explore the surrounding region.

A short drive away are the villages of Narbethong and Buxton with many scenic fishing spots, horse riding trails and bush walks. At Buxton, see the 'Meeting of the Waters' where three mountain rivers come together. Further north you'll find Taggerty and Acheron, whose skylines are dominated by the distinctive Cathedral Ranges.

So many breathtaking views, uncrowded places, peace and quiet. And did we mention all this is only 90 minutes from Melbourne?

NATURAL WONDERS

Marysville and surrounds is the ideal location for lovers of nature, adventure and outdoor activities from adrenaline charged mountain biking and snow sports to more leisurely hiking and bushwalking pursuits.

Venture into one of the many state and national parks and discover waterfalls, scenic lookouts, historic bridges, fern gullies and magnificent mountain ash and eucalypt forests.

Far, far away...is closer than you think.



Marysville was established in 1864 as a stopping point for diggers travelling along the Yarra Track on their way to the riches of the goldfields.

Visitors passing through were attracted to the natural beauty of the region and soon small guesthouses began to appear and by the 1920s Marysville had become a popular holiday and honeymoon destination.

Timber cutters realised the potential in the great forests and, until recent years, timber milling was a key industry in the region. Our giant trees were known as the 'Tallest Trees in the British Empire'.

Discover the Kinglake Ranges. Delicious local produce, fine wines, stunning walks and waterfalls - and all only 50 minutes from Melbourne!

The Kinglake Ranges are situated a little more than 50kms north-east of Melbourne and include the villages and hamlets of Kinglake, Kinglake Central, Kinglake West, Pheasant Creek, Glenburn and Toolangi. The area is surrounded by some 22,000 hectares of national parkland. Kinglake National Park is the largest, and closest national park to Melbourne, making it an ideal spot for a day trip or a weekend getaway.

Established in 1928 to protect native fauna and flora, the park features Masons Falls, Mt Sugarloaf Lookout, Jehosaphat Gully, Wombelano Falls, an abundance of wildlife, secluded camping spots and plenty of walking tracks to explore. It's a slice of nature with a sprinkle of serenity.

There is no lake at Kinglake! The Kinglake township was named after British historian Alexander William Kinglake.

Other popular attractions include the fabulous Bollygum Adventure Playground, Kinglake Ranges Heritage Trail, Dindi Arts Trail, Wirrawilla Rainforest Walk and the Frank Thomson Reserve for stunning city views.

The climate and topography of the Kinglake Ranges produces an amazing range of quality food, including fresh berries, vegetables and cool-climate wines.

If you fancy a taste of Kinglake produce or want to know more about what is in season, why not bring your basket along to one of the monthly markets or stop in at a farmgate.







EILDON & SURROUNDS



Eildon, Thornton and Rubicon have long been popular destinations for those seeking to take some time to slow down and escape the pace of city life. Pleasure boaters and fishing enthusiasts share holidays alongside those aboard luxury houseboats and families camping by the river. The vibe is relaxed, friendly and fun.

Surrounded by national parks and state forests and connected by pristine rivers, with the magnificent Lake Eildon as the centerpiece, this is the perfect place for 'family time' or 'me time'.

Lake Eildon National Park and the Rubicon State Forest offer great camping and bushwalking, timber industry relics, loads of wildlife and stunning wild flowers, particularly in spring and early summer.

HIDDEN GEM

The Mimi Jane is believed to be Australia's oldest purpose built houseboat and is on display at the Eildon Dams Museum. It was built for Mrs Louisa Jones from Rippon Lea and was named after her two poodles!

Mt Torbreck, the highest peak in Murrindindi, is great for an adventurous hike.

The township of Darlingford was flooded to construct the Sugarloaf Reservoir in the late 1920s. The Sugarloaf Reservoir Dam Wall still exists under the waters of Lake Fildon.







Yea is adjoined by a series of hamlets including Glenburn, Murrindindi, Limestone, Highlands, Caveat, Strath Creek, Kerrisdale and Flowerdale. It boasts historic buildings, a thriving main street and a strong arts culture. It's also a key

town on the Great Victorian Rail Trail. With a range of award-winning wineries, restaurants and accommodation options on offer, Yea is the perfect base to explore the area's surrounding scenic and historic sites.

Yea is officially designated as a Cittaslow town (part of the 'Slow Food' movement). Cittaslow towns take the time to slow down, enjoy and appreciate a quality lifestyle.

HIDDEN GEM

Only a short walk from High Street (the town's main street), you'll find the Yea Wetlands. Very popular with nature lovers, photographers, artists, bird watchers and school groups, it provides a great opportunity to immerse yourself in the peace and tranquillity of the bush.

ALEXANDRA & SURROUNDS ROLLING HILLS, LUSH FARMLAND, HISTORY & HERITAGE

Alexandra and the surrounding villages and hamlets of Acheron. Molesworth and Yarck have a proud and rich history of gold and agriculture - still evident today in the many National Trust classified buildings, stately homesteads and grand hotels.

The Great Victorian Rail Trail winds through much of this area making these townships a great stopping off point for cyclists wishing to explore the fabulous range of welcoming country pubs, great eateries, local art galleries and quirky stores.

Food, wine, art and music are the heart and soul of this area and the region plays host to a fantastic and eclectic program of cultural events throughout the year.

A stone's throw from Lake Eildon and the Lake Eildon National Park, Alexandra and surrounds is a great location for outdoor enthusiasts, foodies and history buffs.

When gold was discovered in the 1860s, Alexandra was known as Red Gate, after the gate that separated two grazing stations that prospectors travelled through.

In 1867, Red Gate was renamed Alexandra in honour of the Princess of Wales.



Lake Eildon has over 500km of shoreline and at full capacity can store six times as much water as Sydney Harbour.

Lake Eildon is the only reservoir in Victoria where houseboats are permitted. Water released from Lake Eildon is diverted for irrigation purposes and supplies around 60% of the water used in the Goulburn-Murray Irrigation District.











The lake is a mecca for lovers of water sports including skiing, wakeboarding, kayaking and canoeing. Boat hire equipment is available for those keen for a thrill. Try renting a houseboat or 'boatel' for a truly special Lake Eildon

experience. Nothing is more relaxing than spending a few days out on the water, watching the world go by from the comfort of your own private lounge, or from the top deck as you cast a line and watch the kids swim.

During the 'green season Lake Mountain Alpine Resort's 37km of cross country ski trails transform into walking trails where you can discover beautiful wildflowers, spectacular alpine forest.

The 4km Summit Walk outstanding views to nearby Mt Torbreck, Marysville and right across to Melbourne.

Lake Mountain is Melbourne's closest alpine resort. Just 30 minutes from Marysville and only two hours from Melbourne, it's a year round destination for the whole family.


Over the winter months Lake Mountain Alpine Resort offers a smorgasbord of snow play, with cross country skiing, tobogganing,


From a gentle stroll to a challenging overnight hike, there are a myriad of walks and trails to suit all ages and levels of fitness here in Murrindindi.

Some trails cater to cyclists and horse riders, while others are best experienced on foot. Wander through historic locations and ancient forests. past gushing waterfalls and out to breathtaking lookouts.

In summer, the snow trails of Lake Mountain Alpine Resort offer spectacular mountain views. Explore lush fern gullies in the Yarra Ranges National Park and Marysville State Forest. Enjoy sweeping lake views at Lake Eildon National Park and take in

the panorama of Melbourne's skyline from Kinglake National Park. Experience the breathtaking vistas from the summit of the Cathedral Range. And that's just for starters...



Dozens of spectacular waterfalls are dotted throughout the Murrindindi region, each with a character and timeless beauty of its own. Some are easily accessible via a short stroll while others call for a little more effort to reap the rewards.

TON KNOW'S

Steavenson Falls in Marysville are floodlit at night. An easy 700 metre walk will take you to an awe-inspiring view of one of Victoria's highest waterfalls. Plummeting 84 metres, the falls have been a favourite since the 1860s.

TON KNOP

Murchison Gap is named after John Murchison the original squatter of Kerrisdale Station, one of the three original squatting runs in the district. The lookout at Murchison Gap commands breathtaking views of the 'Valley of a Thousand Hills' and the King Parrot Creek catchment.

- Eildon for a mix of trails for all ages and abilities




GRAVEL RIDING

GREAT VICTORIAN. RAIL TRAIL



From mild to wild. Whether you are looking to unwind or push the limits, we've got all bases covered.

For those who like to get their pulse racing there's climbing and abseiling in the Cathedral Ranges, jet skiing and kayaking on Lake Eildon, or trail bike riding and fourwheel driving at one of our state parks.

There are also plenty of options for those who prefer to turn it down a notch and quietly enjoy the surrounds. Play a round or two of golf or saddle up and head into the bush on a day or overnight horse ride.

Escape by car or bike to tour around Murrindindi. Take a scenic drive up and over the Great Divide, wind through lush rainforests, stop off at charming towns and villages and admire the stunning views from a lookout.

5 DRIVES TO TRY

- * Wind down the Murchison Gap through Strath Creek and Flowerdale
- * Alexandra to Eildon via Skyline Road
- * A loop via the Highlands from Yea to Yarck

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Cool, clear waters. Crisp fresh air. Spectacular natural surrounds. It's no wonder Murrindindi is celebrated as a mecca for recreational fishing.

Drop a line off the back of a boat at Lake Eildon or nab a spot at Eildon Pondage. For river fishing, it doesn't get much better than the Goulburn River - one of Victoria's premier fishing locations.

For those looking for a different challenge, there's also excellent fishing to be had in many of the local streams, including the Murrindindi River near Yea. the Rubicon River near Thornton and the Steavenson River at Marysville or Buxton.

Be sure to drop in to a local tackle store for the best advice, bait and a licence. BYO bragging rights and camera!












Murrindindi has long been a magnet for artists seeking inspiration from the spectacular landscapes and natural environments of the mountains, rivers and forests.


Painters, potters, sculptors and textile artists work from studios and workshops scattered throughout the villages and hamlets of the region. From internationallylauded artists to local

Marry this produce with sensational cool-climate wines, pure honey, fresh berries and the finest olive oil and the table is set for a truly magnificent meal.

Our towns and villages have thriving food and wine scenes, with a great selection of produce stores, pubs, cafes and restaurants where you can sample the fabulous local produce on offer.

Murrindindi's cool climate produces elegant, food-friendly wines. Vines were first planted in the region in the 1970s and many of our family-owned and run wineries offer boutique cellar door experiences in some seriously cool surroundings.

A first bush camping experience, fishing from a river bridge, cycling the Rail Trail, snow play in the mountains, Murrindindi offers endless opportunities for kids to connect with nature.

Lake Mountain Alpine Resort and the Yea Wetlands Discovery Centre have year-round family activities on offer and there's always heaps of fun to be had by the water at Lake Eildon.

You'll find a range of accommodation available throughout Murrindindi from hotels and motels, self-contained cottages and cosy B&Bs, to scenic

camping, caravanning and farmstays.

For those who love to camp, you're spoilt for choice in Murrindindi with a great range of caravan parks and camping areas in state and national parks throughout the region.


